Year 11 Legal Studies Excursion to the Supreme and District Courts

On Wednesday, 21 August, 50 Year 11 Legal Studies students from Mountain Creek State High School visited the Supreme and District Courts in Brisbane for an immersive experience in Queensland's legal system. The excursion provided students with firsthand exposure to courtroom proceedings and legal roles in practice.



A highlight of the day was an interactive session with a judge, who guided students through the structure and function of a courtroom. Each student took on a key role: twelve students sat in the jury box, where jurors assess evidence and determine a verdict; one student took the witness stand, the position from which sworn testimony is given; another sat at the judge's bench, donning the traditional wig and robe while overseeing proceedings; and Mr. Catterall was placed in the dock, the secure area designated for an accused person during trial. This hands-on experience allowed students to engage directly with the court process and understand the significance of each role.





Following this, students broke into small groups and observed real-world criminal trials in both the Supreme and District Courts. They witnessed barristers presenting legal arguments, judicial officers presiding over cases, and court personnel managing proceedings. This experience reinforced their theoretical knowledge and provided valuable insight into courtroom etiquette, trial processes, and legal advocacy in practice.

The excursion was an invaluable opportunity for students to deepen their understanding of the law and see the justice system in action. Court staff have since contacted the school to commend the students for their exemplary behaviour throughout the visit. A special thank you to Dylan Catterall, Julie Fielke, and Rebecca Suanez for their support and involvement.

Year 12 Business Students Explore Repositioning at Wildlife HQ

On 30 May our Year 12 Business class had the unique opportunity to visit Wildlife HQ Zoo as part of their studies on repositioning strategies. The excursion provided firsthand insights into how small businesses adapt and thrive in competitive environments. Wildlife HQ, located at the Big Pineapple site, has repositioned itself in response to competition from major attractions like Australia Zoo. Rather than competing head-to-head, WH has built its identity around affordability, close-up animal experiences-especially with primates—and a strong community presence. Students learned how the zoo has relied on grassroots marketing, passionate staff, and creative problem-solving to build its brand. With limited funding and no formal strategic plan until recently, the zoo has operated with resilience-hand-making signage, recycling materials, and engaging in outreach like the 'Zoo to You' program. Now, with plans to collaborate with nearby businesses and upgrade facilities, Wildlife HQ is ready to develop a five-year strategy. Students examined how the zoo aims to enhance guest experiences, increase conservation efforts, and eventually transition into a more structured, sustainable operation—all while keeping animal welfare at the forefront. The visit offered a rich, real-world case study in repositioning, strategic planning, and business growth under constraint-valuable lessons for our future entrepreneurs and business leaders.

and the importance of being disciplined and always trying hard.





He fondly recalled living in Japan with his family. He trained and played for Honda Heat, a Japanese rugby union team,

based in Suzuka City in Mie Precture.



Mr Gear spoke about how living overseas brought with it challenges, especially with regards to the language barrier.



By studying Japanese and stepping out of his comfort zone, he was able to make new friendships and really enjoy everyday life in Japan. Mr Gear said his favourite Japanese words were "sugoi" (awesome) and "Otsukare" (thanks for your hard work).



When asked what he wished he had known as a 12 year old, Mr Gear replied, "take a language class."



Highlights from Mr Gear's life in Japan included relaxing in the onsen or hot springs after training, winning second division and moving up into first division,



riding his scooter to training, eating at the local yakiniku restaurant and the connections and friendships he made while he was overseas.

Mr Gear's parting advice to us was; "going to class is an opportunity to learn". Being a professional sports person means lots of hard work and discipline. It has also brought opportunities to travel, meet new people, learn new languages and experience the world.

Spanish Language Immersion Trip 2026

The languages department is excited to announce a proposed trip to Spain in 2026, supported by our school's P&C at a recent meeting. Our young scholars then used their Spanish to complete activity passports, first of all taking a quick (virtual) trip to Madrid and Barcelona, before learning a bit about self-introductions, countries, numbers and art, disguised within games set in the Amazon region, activities learning about famous Spanish artists and Spanish conquest stories about the Americas including the

legend of El Dorado.





As well as walking away with new knowledge and some Spanish Gold, the students also received a handout about the Online Global Passport program and the Online Beginners Language Program run through Education Queensland to discuss at home with parents and classroom teachers.


Premier's Reading Challenge
